DON'T LET THE FEAR OF MISPRONOUNCING STOP YOU BY TERRY SLOANE, INDEPENDENT TOEIC FACILITATOR

It is quite frequent to find that English learners try to pronounce the target language the way that they pronounce their own mother tongue. Specifically in Spanish speakers, there are some aspects in pronunciation that will make a difference in being understood or not, getting a good score or not. Here are some tips that teachers might find useful to share with their students:

- 1. Spanish speakers tend to add an e before words that have s+consonant at the beginning. Pronouncing "espík" instead of /spiːk/ (International Pronunciation Alphabet, IPA). This can be solved by starting by e gentle release of air through the mouth, to pronounce a direct s instead of es
- 2. Letter t is not pronounced the same in Spanish and in English. While in the first requires the placement of the tongue at the base of the frontal teeth when pronouncing this sound, the second requires for the tongue to be placed at the palate.
- 3. There is no way that the sound the pronounced correctly if the tongue doesn't touch the edge of the front teeth and extend slightly outside the mouth.

These tips give us an idea of the relevance of minding the placement of the organs in our mouths to pronounce correctly, remembering that, even when in both cases the Latin alphabet is used, the letters might not represent the same sounds. It is a good practice to be aware of the benefits of learning to read the IPA. Additionally, exploring our app stores might lead us to really useful apps for understanding English pronunciation.

HOW IS THE TOEIC SPEAKING TEST SCORED?

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These are the bases for the guidelines used by expert raters who follow strict guidelines to grade the TOEIC productive skills tests (Speaking and Writing) to guarantee fair and consistent scoring. They evaluate the recordings and texts that are produced during test administration.

Here are the scoring guides for the TOEIC Speaking Test.

1 - 2: Read a Text Aloud

The directions and Read-a-Text-Aloud text will appear on your screen.

You will hear the directions being read by the narrator. After 45 seconds, you will hear "Begin reading aloud now." Then you will read the text, and your response will be recorded. An example is below.

Scoring Guide for Questions 1–2: Pronunciation

3	Pronunciation is highly intelligible, though the response may include minor lapses and/or other language influence.
2	Pronunciation is generally intelligible, though it includes some lapses and/or other language influence.
1	Pronunciation may be intelligible at times, but significant other language influence interferes with appropriate delivery of the text.
0	No response OR no English in the response OR response is completely unrelated to the test.

Scoring Guide for Questions 1-2:

Intonation and Stress

3	Use of emphases, pauses, and rising and falling pitch is appropriate to the text.
2	Use of emphases, pauses, and rising and falling pitch is generally appropriate to the text, though the response includes some lapses and/or moderate other language influence.
1	Use of emphases, pauses, and rising and falling pitch is not appropriate, and the response includes significant other language influence.
0	No response OR no English in the response OR the response is completely unrelated to the test.

Test Prep Essentials:

- Use a pronunciation app to clarify any phonetic doubts.
- Use any text-to-speech tool to model your pronunciation and intonation.
- Keep in mind that intonation is key, practice correct intonation patterns to excel in the test.
- Practice reading aloud and recording yourself.
- Instructors and teachers can share these tips with their classes and/or practice oral skills in every lesson.



3: Describe a Picture

There is one Describe-a-Picture question on the TOEIC Speaking Test. The directions and the picture will appear on your screen. You will hear the directions read by the narrator. After 30 seconds, you will hear "Begin speaking now." Then you will describe the picture, and your response will be recorded. An example is below.

Test Prep Essentials:

- Train directed attention, so that it is easy to understand the task.
- Train selecting images into static and dynamic.
- Observe the different plains in the image: in the front, in the middle, in the background.
- Improve vocabulary, work on idiomatic expressions, collocations, and phrasal verbs.
- Practice requesting any AI tool to generate images following your instructions.
- Practice writing descriptions of images and then requesting any AI image to check the descriptions for correctness.
- Practice idea organization using diagrams as outlines.
- Practice categorization of ideas and order.



4, 5, 6: Respond to Questions

Questions 4–6 are three short questions about a single topic. The directions will appear on your screen, and you will hear the directions read by the narrator. Then the introduction and question 4 will appear on your screen and you will hear them read by the narrator. After the narrator reads question 4, you will hear a beep. Then you will have 15 seconds to answer. Your response will be recorded. Then, question 5 will appear on your screen and be read by the narrator. After the beep you will have 15 seconds to answer. Your response will be recorded. Then question 6 will appear on your screen and be read by the narrator. After the beep you will have 30 seconds to answer. Your response will be recorded. Examples of questions 4, 5, and 6 are below.

Imagine that you are a realtor and that you are showing a house to a potential client. The home is suitable for a middle-class family with kids and pets. The neighborhood is safe and quiet. Answer the following questions:

- 1. We have two dogs; do you think the house is suitable for them?
- 2. As soon as we move in, we want to celebrate our daughter's birthday with a barbecue. Do you think this could be possible?
- 3. In your opinion, what are the pros and cons of this property?

Test Prep Essentials:

- Your opinions will not be of consequence as long as they are socially correct, respond to the question, and follow the prompt.
- Your speech is articulated and easy to follow.
- Your volume is sufficient for the raters to hear your response.
- Your answers are well-organized, cohesive, and coherent.
- Both your pronunciation and intonation are clear.
- Make sure you are surrounded by English stimuli as much as possible.

7, 8, 9: Respond to Questions Using Information Provided

Questions 7–9 are three short questions based on a schedule of events. The directions will appear on your screen, and you will hear the directions read by the narrator. Then the schedule will appear on your screen.

You will have 30 seconds to study the schedule. Then, you will hear the beginning of a telephone call. The call includes questions about the information in the schedule.

After the caller's first question, you will hear a beep. You will have 15 seconds to answer the question as if you were speaking on the telephone. Then the caller will ask a second question. The question will be followed by a beep, and you will have 15 seconds to answer the question.

- 7. Could you tell me what time the course starts and how long it will last?
- 8. How much does the course attendance cost?
- 9. Do I need to bring my laptop or will it be in a computer lab?

3	The response is a full, relevant, socially appropriate reply to the question. In the case of Questions 7–9, information from the prompt is accurate. The delivery requires little listener effort. The choice of vocabulary is appropriate. The use of structures fulfills the demands of the task.

10 Propose a Solution

There is one Propose-a-Solution question on the TOEIC Speaking Test. The directions will appear on your screen, and you will hear the directions read by the narrator. Then you will hear a telephone message. The message will last 30–45 seconds. The message will describe a problem.

You will respond as if you are the person receiving the message. After the message, you will have 30 seconds to prepare. Then you will hear "Begin speaking now." You will have 60 seconds to respond. Your response will be recorded. An example is below.

Respond as if you work at the store.

In your response, be sure to

- · show that you recognize the problem, and
- propose a way of dealing with the problem. Now listen to the voice message.


3. Limited Creativity in Language Use
